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Heebner Tread Power

After years of searching, WHS and the Montgomery County Museum Curator reached an agreement to lend the Society a Heebner Direct-Geared, One-Horsepower, Tread Power. It was manufactured in 1896 by the Worcester family, David Heebner and Sons in their Lansdale factory. The Tread Power was one of many modern agricultural improvements in the post Civil War Period

patented by Heebner which included threshers, saws, grain crackers, etc. The Tread Power allowed horses to run farm machinery. The machine is now in the "Bill Bourne Farm Museum" at the Farmers Union Hall in Center Point. We thank the county for this addition:"Courtesy of the Peter Wentz Farmstead, County of Montgomery." To make room for this addition we needed to find a home for our existing Tread Power, manufactured in 1880 by J. Robinson & Sons in Curwensville, PA . We are pleased to announce that the Curwensville Historical Society has been searching for this exact piece for many years. The Tread Power has now been donated and relocated to their museum in Clearfield County.

Frog Hollow School and the American School in Switzerland

The Worcester Historical Society has been approached by the American School in Switzerland, "TASIS", to participate in their 60th anniversary. The school is located near Lugano, Switzerland and has subsidiaries in many other European countries. M. Crist Fleming, founder of the first American School in Switzerland located near Lugano, also created and ran a "country day school" and summer program from 1945 - 1955 in Worcester! Known as Frog Hollow School

and Frog Hollow Farm Summer Camp, it attracted local students as well as a great number of foreign students from international families. In 1956 Fleming moved the whole school and many students to her new boarding school in Switzerland.

The American School in Switzerland has asked us to provide archival material concerning the time frame that Frog Hollow School was in operation. Thanks to good record keeping, WHS has a file, several brochures from the period and several clothing items such as tennis sport blazers. A number of these items were incorporated into the A History of Worcester book. Equally, if not more important, are archives at the Frog Hollow Tennis Club.

Worcester Elementary Visits the Farmers Union Hall

In the fall, our community outreach continued with a two day visit to our Farmers Union Hall from the fourth grade at Worcester Elementary. There is a rich connection to the school, and over the years, the Hall acted as an extension of the High School, which stood close to where the current Elementary School is located today. The upstairs of the Hall was used as a gymnasium at times early in the 1900s, from 1908 - 1911. The Farmer's Union Hall was also the High School for Worcester, graduating its first class in 1909. It is always a great opportunity to share Worcester's community history with another group of future graduates. Many thanks go out to the staff at Worcester for their support and continued commitment to these yearly visits. It is a wonderful relationship allowing us to share our knowledge to keep history alive, and for the students who are enthusiastic to hear about their Worcester community.

Lester Landes Papers

The Worcester Historical Society has made available the collection of work done by Lester Landes in 1984. Lester was a founding member of the Historical Society and spent four years transcribing the "Montgomery Transcript", the newspaper of the day, which covered Worcester and surrounding towns. The paper was first published in Skippack beginning in 1885, and it was stopped in 1952. Lester reviewed 67 years of newspapers at the Schwenkfelder Library and laboriously typed two documents. The first is the "Lester Landes Legacy" of 400 pages, which chronologically accounts for all the stories of Worcester during this time frame. The second document is the "Lester Landes Special Topics", 190 pages of thematic events. Want to know about the schools of Worcester or the Ku Klux in Worcester? This document will tell you all about them. You can also do a word search on these documents if you have Acrobat installed on your computer. These documents are available on our website under "Local History".

Ancient Trees of Worcester

The 1976 Bicentennial celebrated 200 years of nationhood and designated eighteen trees in Worcester as Bicentennial Trees. Today, only three oak trees remain: (7), (8), and (15) in the A History Worcester book. In 2024, two white oaks were lost, one on Mill Road and another at Stump Hall and Valley Forge Roads, the latter being a historical landmark that shaded a trolley stop and Stump Hall School. 
